

Why report service

How do clubs and districts individually benefit from reporting service?

- » Reporting service helps transfer knowledge and best practices to your club's future leaders. Club officers can review past service activity reports, learn from the successes of the club's previous activities and better plan for their future activities.
- » Reporting service is a matter of local pride. Reporting puts your club on the map as leaders in your local community, and it's an important way to share success with other clubs in your district and around the world.
- » A high percentage of clubs reporting service is a sign of a healthy district.
- » Reporting service allows you to become eligible for service awards.

How do clubs and districts collectively benefit from reporting service?

- Reporting shines a light on how and where local clubs are making a difference. This elevates the profile of Lions Clubs International as a global service club organization.
- » Service reports provide tangible evidence of our global engagement and impact to prospective partners of Lions Clubs International. These relationships strengthen the organization and yield benefits at the local level.
- » People want to participate in real, visible change. Service reporting allows clubs to continually engage communities, tell stories more effectively and ultimately grow their member base.

How does reporting service benefit the people we serve?

- » Service data helps everyone understand the needs of communities around the world and how our Lions and Leos are serving those needs.
- » Because service activities are scalable, one small service project can become the next global initiative of the organization. But Lions Clubs International is not aware of such projects unless they are reported.
- » Service data enables Lions Clubs International to identify best practices that can be shared globally.
- » Measurement leads to insight. Setting higher goals each year mobilizes the organization toward growth.
- » Service reports show how Lions and Leos around the world are using funds from Lions Clubs International Foundation grants to serve their communities. This visibility encourages Lions and Leos to think creatively about their own projects and apply for LCIF grants themselves.

Additional benefits

- » Reporting is the final step in completing a service project. If it's not reported, it's not done!
- » Reporting service is a lot like voting. You may think your report doesn't make a big difference, but the only way we'll be successful is if everyone does their small part.
- » Reporting is considered service in itself. The time clubs and districts spend reporting their service are considered volunteer hours, and can be reported in MyLion.

Two programs are available to aid with vision screening and providing eye exams and glasses to those in need.

The first program provides up to \$500.00 to assist with vision screening. The \$500.00 is a non-matching grant and is awarded to one club in each district. The grant is available twice a year. Applications are available on the Lions SEE website www.lionsseeny.org

The second program is designed to assist with eye exams and glasses for those who cannot afford these services. Each district is eligible for up to \$1000.00 non-matching grant. The club identifies the need and submits the request to your District Governor. The DG will contact Lions SEE and arrange for the payment to the club. For example, if your club want to help someone and the cost is \$350.00, that means there is still \$650.00 available in the district.

What is a Club Administrator and should you have one?

In order to assist some club officers who may have difficulty operating certain technologies, Lions Clubs International created the role of "club administrator" to support a club president or secretary with administrative tasks that are completed through MyLCI and MyLion. This role has access to the same information in MyLCI and MyLion as the club president and secretary. Together and in consultation, the president and secretary may assign this administrative role if deemed beneficial for the effective club operations. The club administrator is not a formal position recognized by LCI, but functions to provide administrative assistance only.

Childhood Cancer

September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, a time to recognize the children and families affected by childhood cancers, and to emphasize the importance of supporting research related to these devastating conditions.

Each year, approximately four hundred thousand children and adolescents world-wide, under the age of twenty, are diagnosed with cancer. In the United States an estimated 15,780 children and adolescents in that age range are diagnosed with cancer. Approximately one in two hundred eighty-five children in the United States will be diagnosed with cancer before their twentieth birthday.

Most childhood cancers can be cured with chemotherapy and other forms of treatment, including surgery and radiation therapy. Treatment of childhood cancer can be extremely costly for the families and affects families across all income settings.

Lend An Ear



The Lions Lend an Ear Foundation, serving both Nassau and Suffolk counties, is designed to provide quality hearing aids at no cost to low-income individuals who have a hearing loss. This program began in the early 2000s and remains committed to "Giving the Gift of Hearing."

Hearing aid prices can range from \$800 to \$4000 each, resulting in a cost ranging from \$1600 and \$8000 per pair for individuals requiring two. Currently, only twenty-three states in the US mandate insurance companies to provide hearing aids to children and/or adults, but New York State is not one of them.

Our Foundation, working with local audiologists and funded through monetary and used hearing aid donations, provides resources to those in need to improve their hearing and the quality of their lives. Hearing enables us to socialize, work, interact, and communicate. To quote Helen Keller: "The lack of vision cuts me off from things; the lack of hearing cuts me off from people."

Campaign 100 Enters Its Final Year

In 2018, LCIF launched Campaign 100, an effort to raise \$300 million in three years to help fund Lions projects and humanitarian efforts well into the future. To date, over \$220 million has been raised. Since the COVID-19 pandemic closed much of the world for many months and continues to limit interactions in some places, Lions International has extended Campaign 100 for another year. Campaign 100 will continue through June 30, 2022.

Partnering with Lions to support communities in times of need has always been one of LCIF's missions. Just as LCIF responds to the needs of communities in the aftermath of natural disasters, LCIF is supporting communities severely impacted by COVID-19. LCIF has provided over 190 COVID related grants and \$3,500,000 to support these communities, including a \$200,000 grant awarded to MD20 in 2020.

The global pandemic has not diminished the demand on LCIF to support clubs and districts that seek to address disaster relief, hunger, vision, diabetes, childhood cancers, youth services, and other humanitarian efforts in the communities we serve and the world beyond our borders. That is why we must continue to support LCIF.

District 20-K2 was asked to raise \$200,000 to help fund Campaign 100. The Lions and clubs of this district have accepted that challenge and have donated over \$163,000 to date. We need your help to raise the remaining \$37,000 this fiscal year to meet our district goal. We are off to a good start in the first quarter of this year. Since July, clubs and individual Lions have donated \$4,554.00 to LCIF. Let's pick up the pace and meet our target by the end of June!



School is in session! Each year as summer draws to a close, it's time to be aware of children back in school. Watch for children running out between cars to catch the bus. Remember it is against the law to pass a stopped school bus whose red lights are flashing, or the extended stop sign is protruding from the bus. Cars in BOTH directions must yield to the stopped bus. Be aware of distracted mothers, pushing strollers while on their phones and watch out for students looking down at their phones or wearing earbuds; they are distracted and might not see cars while in the crosswalk. Observe and obey speed limits, especially in a school zone. Let's all hope that school stays in session and our children go back to regular classes!

Cell Phone Service Project. Start a cell phone collection in your community. The **911 Cell Phone Bank** organization collects all cell phones, tablets, and laptops, in any condition. Since 2004, the 911 Cell Phone Bank, a network of over 1500 law enforcement and victim services agencies has enabled them to distribute over 150,000 emergency cell phones to vulnerable citizens in communities nationwide. While they do not offer airtime with these devices, many are able to be activated with local and nationwide carriers, and all devices are provided at no cost to their partner agencies. Over the years the organization has provided emergency cell phones to victims of abuse and to senior citizens, provided tablets to women's shelters, laptops to law enforcement, and smartphone to teachers for use in high school app development courses. 


Three new members of Nassau Central Lions Club were inducted on August 18, 2021 by our District Governor Paula Umreiko.
